
Seahorse National Park in the Bahamas is officially open!

Dr. Steve Kucera (Biology) and newly minted Ph.D. in genomics from a joint Johns Hopkins/NIH program and UT alum Dr. Leif Benner ('13 and pictured above) have had a productive collaborative research program for the past 5 years. Their work on female sterility involves using classic Mendelian mapping followed by DNA sequencing with the goal of identifying mutations that cause female sterility in *Drosophila* mutant screens.

They have heavily involved UT students who have been supported by multiple SURF and OURI grants. Past UT students Jill Gomez ('20), now in her 2nd year at Northwestern Medical School and Savannah Muron ('21), who is now pursuing her Ph.D. in genomics at UNC, with a full ride scholarship each, continued in Dr. Benner's lab in NIH post-Baccalaureate positions for 2 years after graduating from UT. Most recently, Charli Wingfield (December, '23; pictured above) just started her post-baccalaureate degree at NIH. Lorielle Raab will join Dr. Benner at NIH as well after she graduates in May '24. To round out their successful collaboration involving UT students, Myles Hammond ('19) recently completed his MS degree in genomics at UC Davis in the lab of former UT professor Dr. Becky Bellone and will be applying to medical schools in the very near future.



Empowering Nurses: Reflecting on Advocacy Days in Tallahassee

This January, a remarkable journey unfolded as faculty members from the Department of Nursing, including **Dr. Bryant, Dr. Ernewein, Dr. Parsons, and Dr. Pedroff**, joined forces with the executive board of the Student Nurses Association (SNA) - Ellie Bouchard, Karoline Grajewski, Becca Turner, and Caitlyn Whalen - to partake in the Florida Nurses Association's (FNA) Advocacy Days at the capitol in Tallahassee, Florida.

Advocacy Days, FNA's flagship annual event, offered both our faculty and student nurses a unique opportunity to delve into current legislative issues and specific bills affecting nursing practice and the healthcare landscape in Florida. More importantly, it provided a platform for meaningful one-on-one discussions with legislators, enabling our representatives to advocate passionately for the nursing profession.

The feedback from our student nurses about this experience has been exceptionally positive, underscoring the importance and impact of such advocacy work. **Dr. Botwinski**, the Director of Nursing, has recognized the value of this initiative and has pledged ongoing support for our annual participation.





During the winter break 15 University of Tampa Physician Assistant students, alongside Assistant Professors **Dr. Allison Kaczmarek, Dr. Roman Sereda, and Chris Taylor** went to San Jose Costa Rica to provide medical aid to South/Central American immigrant populations including children, elderly, refugees, as well as people of the local community including those without homes. Medical activities included physical assessments, medical consultations, pharmaceutical agent distribution for treatment, as well as patient education including basic hygiene. Students and Faculty had a chance to immerse in local culture and made a big impact in the underserved communities at hand.
