What Will You Learn?

The music program at The University of Tampa combines the best of liberal arts inquiry and conservatory rigor. Students achieve a solid foundation in theory, aural skills, history and literature. Students also develop a broad range of musical interests through a comprehensive curriculum.

UT's music faculty includes nationally recognized performers, conductors, composers, technologists and scholars who are dedicated to nurturing the success of their students. By taking advantage of the numerous experiential opportunities the Department of Music offers, students prepare themselves for a variety of musical pursuits after graduation.

The **major in music education** is distinguished by its unique integration of experiential teaching opportunities throughout the curriculum, which enables students to develop teaching skills before they begin their internships. Students

graduating from the program are certified to teach K–12 music. It is a four-year professional degree program.

A major in performance allows students to develop a high level of skill in their primary performance area, as well as a secondary performance area through extensive private study, ensemble participation and performance opportunities. It is a four-year professional degree program.

A major in music is ideal for students who plan to focus on music technology and composition in their musical careers. This program only requires 52 credits, allowing students to easily pursue a double major. The curriculum can be combined with other UT degrees as a bridge toward future graduate study or career opportunities in fields such as music therapy or music industry. A minor in music is also available.

Students who **major in musical theatre** develop performance skills and repertoire while actively participating in main stage and studio theatre productions, musical revues, opera scenes and music ensemble performances. It is a four-year degree offered collaboratively with the Department of Speech, Theatre and Dance.

Hein Jung associate professor, music voice, opera, musical theatre

Hein Jung specializes in opera, oratorio and recital repertoire. She has performed throughout the United States as well as internationally in South Korea, Canada and Spain. Known for her virtuosity as a performer, she recently performed the role of Zerbinetta in Richard Strauss's opera, *Ariadne auf Naxos*. Currently she is recording an album of songs by Franz Liszt for Centaur Records.



Music Technology

Music technology students have access to a digital multiple track recording studio for producing professional portfolios of their work. The UT music technology curriculum teaches students advanced skills for audio production and electroacoustic music composition. Students also get hands-on training in field recording and studio production. They learn to mix and master using Logic Pro and to design their own software with Max/MSP.

Performance Opportunities and Venues

The Ferman Music Center includes three large ensemble rehearsal rooms, a recording studio, computer music studio, music technology lab, electronic piano lab, technologyenhanced classrooms, Wenger practice modules, faculty offices and teaching studios. Performance venues include the Falk Theatre (a historic 1.000-seat theatre), Reeves Theater (with a 7.1 surround sound system and multimedia capabilities), the Sykes Chapel and Center for Faith and Values (equipped with a 58-stop mechanical action Dobson organ and Blüthner concert grand piano) and the three historic ballrooms in Plant Hall: the Music Room, Grand Salon and Fletcher Lounge.

The Department of Music sponsors more than 100 free concerts and master classes every year, including performances by internationally renowned concert artists and composers, professional ensembles,

UT music faculty, as well as student ensembles and recitals. UT's riverfront campus is located in downtown Tampa, within walking distance of a regional performing arts center, major museums and other arts venues. Tampa Bay ranks among the four largest communities of artists in the Southeast United States.

Scholarships

Students who perform a live audition (on-campus or through Skype) may be eligible for music scholarship consideration. Music scholarships are renewable for up to four years.

Qualifications:

In order to be considered for a music scholarship, students must meet all of the initial following requirements:

- Be a new student (freshmen or transfer) entering in the fall term
- Be a United States citizen or permanent resident
- Complete a successful music audition before March 1
- Complete a UT Admissions application and be accepted for full-time study
- Major or minor in music and/or participate in an assigned music ensemble

Audition Procedures:

Students must audition for acceptance to the music degree program of their choice. They must also audition to qualify for a scholarship. To audition:

- Complete an online audition request form (go to www.ut.edu/musicaudition).
- Prepare audition requirements based on your primary performance area and preferred degree (go to www.ut.edu/music/auditions).

Students may also submit an audition through YouTube by posting a continuous, complete audition and providing their video link on their audition request form. Note: YouTube auditions are not eligible for music scholarship consideration.
